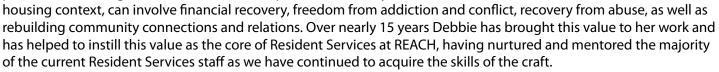

Community Leadership Institute

This past October, REACH sent two Resident Services Coordinators and 5 REACH residents to Cincinnati, Ohio for a Community Leadership Institute, put on by NeighborWorks® America. There they had the chance to take courses in community leadership, ranging in topics from "Going Green" to "Celebrating Diversity" to "Community Gardening". The catch for this exciting excursion was that the team from REACH was to organize an event that would improve the larger REACH community. The idea that they generated was that of a "REACH Resident Empowerment Expo", where all of REACH's residents would be invited and encouraged to share their passions...from art, music, culinary arts, volunteering and spoken word. REACH submitted this idea to NeighborWorks® and received a grant to help put it on. This event is scheduled to occur on May 30th from 11-3 pm at St Philip Neri Parish on SE 17th and Division St. It will include Cooking demonstrations, art booths, an open mic, raffles, snacks and vendors such as TriMet, Portland Metro, Scrap to name a few. Just another exciting event to build REACH's community and engage our residents in some creative activities to spice up their lives!



Clark County Workshops

Residents of REACH in Clark County have been very busy! Approximately 30 people graduated from skill building workshops in less than two months.

Gateway Gardens residents in Washougal participated in a series of three Leadership Development Workshops with Allen Kvalvik. The workshops focused on qualities that help parents and leaders to build healthy relationships. Some of the topics included realizing ones value, building trust, and searching for significance and building self-worth.

In March the residents of Covington Commons, Cascadia Village and the Mews participated in a series of financial capability workshops.

Week 1, residents engaged in an activity called "Habitudes", a card game to help them determine how their core values, beliefs and outside influences impact their financial decisions. At this point they also began the task of keeping receipts and tracking their expenses to the penny!

Week 2 was all about Credit Reports; what they mean, why we have them, how they can help or hurt us and dealing with debt. Credit reports can affect our lives significantly; residents met the challenge of understanding and repairing their credit and committed to continue their work in individual coaching sessions.

And then Week 3 - budgeting! How do we budget on very limited resources? The work done in previous classes, including vision mapping, and resident dreams are becoming reality. Nothing happens overnight, but with a dream, a plan, and the follow through...YOUR DREAMS are possible!

There's an amazing ripple effect of goodwill and greater community awareness as you tell your family and friends about REACH.

Our goals for the Gold Star program are to:

- Build stronger relationships with volunteers

In 2014 we had 50 volunteers: 24 REACH residents, 12 in Washington and 14 outside, which went above and beyond. REACH residents contributed over 62% of the total hours recorded. It is an honor and pleasure to know that these volunteers are part of the REACH team.
